

A Letter from The Manse

Then there's walking Bonnie the Dog in Goddington park at 7am – I'm sure I leapt out with joy each morning, all but a month ago, but now in the dim and chilly morning even the dog is reluctant to get out of his bed when he sees me pull my boots on. Quite frankly my get up and go seems to have got up and gone along with the summer sun.

It's amazing how the weather can affects our mood, our motivation and our even our temper. Do you ever have those days when you look out the window and if it's blowing a gale or raining hard you think and you think 'Im not going out!' You had plans to do this and that jobs done in the garden, things to pick up in the shops or maybe a visit to a friend but the weather has zapped your enthusiasm.

Well we wouldn't be British (or people living in Britain) if weather wasn't a topic high on the agenda.

And yet though I must confess I'm more of a spring and summer man rather than an autumn or winter one I rejoice that God has given us ever changing Seasons. The change of temperature, lengthening and shortening of days, the different fragrances, the colours each bringing a special character to every month.

The Seasons are often referred to in The Bible whether that's in the very well known passage in Ecclesiastes 3:1-22 where the philosopher speaks of the seasons we experience as our life unfolds or the exhortation to know the spiritual seasons as in Matthew 24:32 but my favourite season quote comes from The Song of Solomon (when was the last time you read that?)

There is something here not only about waiting for the weather to get a bit nicer but there is an echo of The Season of The Kingdom which God has promised will come.

One final tip for you. I find it very helpful when the wind is blowing in my face, or the rain is beating down upon my soaked skin – I make a point of saying Thank you God for the seasons and somehow I feel much better!

Bless us with the assurance that you are in all things, the tragic and the beautiful,


the nightmare and the dream, the light and the darkness.

3 November All Saints Sunday




